THE REFERENDUM

With young people not turning out to vote at elections and interest in voting remaining very low in recent years, Aberdeenshire Council thought it would be a good idea to organise a school wide referendum, especially as senior students, 16 and over, will have a vote in 2014. So on the 17th September 2013, all 21 secondary school students in the Aberdeenshire area




were asked to vote on a simple question, 'Should Scotland be an independent country?'

THE CAMPAIGN

Campaign teams quickly organised themselves. The No campaign chose George Blair (S5) and Sophie Anderson (S4) as their agents. The Yes campaign chose Craig Lyttel (S6) and Antonia Uri (S6). Both groups decided to run the campaign as realistically as possible. They decided to do an opinion poll survey of each registration class before starting their campaigns. This allowed them to get an idea of where their support lay and which year groups they needed to target. The initial survey showed 55% of students said they would vote "No", 20% said they would vote "Yes" and 25% said they didn't know how they would vote.

The Yes campaign decided to concentrate on winning over



the Don't Knows and winning over unsure No voters. The No campaign decided to try and maintain their lead. Both groups decided to concentrate on new technology to get their message across. Facebook was considered but the logistics of setting up a public account were considered overly complicated. Tweets were avoided as group members thought this would only attract the abuse of school trolls - something politicians have to live with! Emails were therefore used a lot by both groups.

The groups decided to win support by giving out lots of lollipops and pens, which went quickly. A referendum newsletter was produced, there was a display in the library and both groups had democracy walls in the E block for posters and leaflets. In the final week of the campaign, both groups decided to distribute leaflets through the registration packs on different days, like free postal leaflets





before every election. The Yes campaign cleverly decided to use the opinion poll survey to direct their leaflets to registration classes with lots of Don't Know voters.

THE ISSUES

Despite students not paying any taxes, the big issues of the adult referendum were highlighted in the school campaign: child poverty, keeping the Queen, keeping the pound, North Sea oil, the banks, the army and nuclear weapons. Also highlighted were saving the Pandas and keeping Daleks on our television screens! Sport was also highlighted as the No campaign said we would lose Team GB while the Yes campaign championed Scottish football. The No campaign ended by using



Winston Churchill as an inspiration while the Yes campaign brought in William Wallace/Mel Gibson as their inspiration.

THOSE CLOSING REMARKS

"We shall defend our island, whatever the cost may be..." – Vote No!

"They may take away our lives, but they'll never take our freedom!" – Vote Yes!

THE VOTE

On Tuesday 17th September the poll took place between 9.15 am and 3.30 pm in the Social Area. Voting went very smoothly under the leadership of the presiding officers: Natasha Walker (S6), Sarah Lewis (S6) and Megan Duthie (S6) with support from a large group of volunteer S5/S6 polling clerks. On the 18th September, campaign group members and counters attended the referendum vote at Meldrum Academy. They then emptied the three ballot boxes and got down to counting.

THE RESULT

Mintlaw Academy: NO voters – 473, Yes voters – 153 Aberdeenshire Result: No voters -8,718, Yes voters -2,847

A year from the day - on the 18th September 2014 - voters who are 16 or over will have their say in the Scottish wide referendum.

Second Years Vote Yes or No to Independence

Recently the S2 Modern Studies Tuition Group held a mini-election with a difference. The pupils divided themselves into two teams and went through the election campaign process. They were judged on the best rosette, flag, canvassing leaflet, teamwork and campaign speech. Mr. Paterson, Faculty Head of Social Subjects, was brought in to do the final judging on the day. Awards were presented for each category. The teams were neck and neck as they had produced work to a very high standard. The final decision was made by the pupils themselves, who voted in the classroom voting booth and the 'yes' team won by a very narrow margin. Mr. Paterson presented each pupil with a certificate of achievement, which had been signed by Mr. Horberry, who was impressed by the standard of work. Each pupil also received a positive referral for all their hard work for the event.

"At the going down of the sun and in the morning, we will remember them."

This quotation from Laurence Binyon sums up the purpose of the Battlefields Experience, according to Mr Kilpatrick who went on the trip. The trip lasted from Sunday 1st September to Friday 6th, but many pupils wish it had been longer.

The group's itinerary was filled to the brim with many exciting activities such as trench visits and memorial and grave visits, finishing with a day in Bruges, where everyone had some spare time.

34 pupils and 3 teachers went on the trip, and we decided to interview a few of them to see how it went.

MR KILPATRICK

Question: What was your favourite part of the trip?

Mr KP: For me, going to the trenches was the most significant part of the trip. The Somme Battlefield was especially poignant for me as it hit home the scale of the slaughter that happened on the first day of the battle. I found the pupils were genuinely shocked at the scale of the killings, and the message of the futility of war was learned deeply and emotionally.

Question: What kind of things did you do?

Mr KP: We were busy all day, and the pupils worked extremely hard often completing 12 hour days. However no one complained and the enjoyment of learning such an important message meant that the hard work passed in a flash. We mostly learned about history and it was great to be able to work out of the classroom in a stimulating and real environment. Pupils experienced first-hand the horrors of war, and the sacrifices of a generation of young men who gave everything to fight for their country. We visited trenches and war memorials. The Theipval Memorial to the

missing had approximately 74,000 names of the fallen on it and it was amazing and sad to see so many names in real life.

Pupils also had some free time in Bruges, which is a walled medieval city and they enjoyed sight seeing, buying souvenirs and eating local dishes (chips with mayonnaise!). This was the perfect end to an emotional trip before returning on the ferry.

Question: Did you mind the travelling that you had to do on the trip?

Mr KP: Well, the return journey on the ferry was made especially interesting by having to share the ferry with 800 Belgian football supporters, who added a touch of good- natured colour and noise to the

journey at the end of our trip.

We also interviewed a 5th year pupil to get her take on the trip.

Question: What was your favourite part of the trip?

Hope: For me, going to the Theipval Memorial was amazing. It is a stone memorial dedicated to 74,000 unknown soldiers. We each tried to find someone with the same last name as us, but it was so difficult because the memorial was huge. It was really emotional and hard to stomach when you saw the masses of names on the memorial.

Question: Would you recommend the trip to other pupils?

Hope: Definitely! I loved the trip, and the whole experience was amazing. Bruges in particular was spectacular and I only wish we had had longer there. Six days wasn't long enough; I could have stayed forever! For me the trip was definitely a success and the best school experience I've ever had.

Ellie Moore

Fourth year pupil Ellie Moore caught the circus bug back in S1, and since then she has been keen to learn as many of the skills of the Circus Arts as she can. This summer, she got the chance to further her interest at an International Circus Festival in France, and also performed at the renowned Edinburgh Fringe. We asked her about her incredible experiences...

How did you get involved in circus skills?

"We did an hour and a half of taster workshops in first year and I discovered I quite liked it. Then I went to a couple more workshops during the holidays and have not looked back since."

When did the opportunity for the trips arise?

"I was told in October/ November time last year that there was going to be a festival in Grenoble, France in the summer of 2013, and we were invited. Then just before we left for France, I was told



we'd got the chance to go to a youth circus festival in Edinburgh too."

What did you get up to while you were away?

"In France, we had to put on a show and perform it to everyone else that was there from around the world. It went brilliantly and directors from other companies asked us to take the show to their countries in a few months. We also got to take part in workshops, perform in two huge parades, take part in another show and watch everyone else's performances. We got to see some amazing sights of Grenoble and we got to visit Paris as well! In Edinburgh we took part in loads of workshops and we watched incredible shows from professional performers. We also got to perform in a cabaret, performing to other youth circuses from around the UK; and that meant I got to perform my routine in the Edinburgh Fringe to two thousand people!"

What kind of workshops were you involved in?

"In France, I did workshops in Commedia dell'Arte which is an old traditional form of Italian comedy from which a lot of clowning and slapstick came. It was taught by an awesome Italian dude called Alberto who is also a musician, and he taught us loads of songs in other languages. Parts of the workshop was taught in Italian, so once I got used to it, I learnt some Italian too!



We did loads of workshops in Edinburgh including clowning, bushing, hat manipulation, walking globe, devils tricks and Diablo, tumbling, stage fighting, handstands, juggling and puppeteering. I also got to do a juggling workshop with a chap named Sean Gandini who is quite a well known professional juggler! I got to help run workshops for the public in the Botanic Gardens as well."

What did you learn while you were away?

"Over the six weeks summer holidays I learned so much! I learnt loads from the workshops that I never thought I would. Not only that, but it was great meeting people from all over the UK and the world that all do the same thing. I've gained friends, confidence and had a lot of fun!"





Engineering & Science update

Offshore Europe

On Wednesday 4th and Friday 6th of September, the Higher Technical Studies class and the Energy Girls were given the opportunity to visit the Offshore Europe event, allowing them the chance to talk to the hundreds of Oil & Gas companies which were in attendance. The event was held at the AECC, with 5 sections covering the entire complex, filled with 1500+ suppliers and exhibitors. The Higher Tech Studs class was accompanied by Mr Melrose to attend the Education Day at the event. The class was first split into two groups and were taken to Opito, which is a training organisation, where they were given a full introductory lecture

with the opportunity to speak to the representatives from different areas of the oil sector. The areas ranged from Human Resources and the economic sector of the oil industry to civil, mechanical and electrical engineering. The purpose of the trip was to give students an introduction to the possible employment opportunities of the industry, and chances to interact with companies and employers. The groups were then appointed three different companies. Companies included Aker Solutions and GDF Suez, and other hugely successful giants of the oil industry. With each company, they had the chance to talk to employees and recruiters, and they were also given a full presentation, offering insight into what each company did.

These sessions proved to be very useful, and a lot of the students left the event with a much clearer view of what kind of career they would like to have in the future.

Another success of the trip was the chance for the ROV group of the school to ask around the different companies for the possibility of a sponsorship deal.



ENGINEERING ROAD SHOW

This term Mintlaw Academy hosted an interactive Science and Engineering roadshow called 'A Rough Guide to Engineering'. Three shows were presented throughout the day to all S2 pupils and S3 Physics pupils.

The show took pupils on a journey around the world, showing the different types of engineering disciplines and highlighting where engineering is used in all sorts of day to day experiences.

The presenter engaged the pupils in lots of interactive activities and they were encouraged to volunteer to help demonstrate various aspects of engineering. For

example aeronautical engineering was highlighted by using a colourful wind up bird and then asking a volunteer to hold a giant beach ball whilst having jets of air fired at them from a giant leaf blower. The beach ball floated in the air flow, thus demonstrating lift.

Civil engineering was also highlighted by discussing earthquake-proof buildings which involved volunteers pushing a moving platform to and fro whilst the demonstrator stood on top holding a tray of jelly.

There was plenty to entertain and inform the pupils throughout the show and most

felt that it had been a very entertaining and useful experience.

Quartet caught up with Edward and found out about his exciting new chapter in this fourth year pupil's footballing career.

Edward told us how it all began.

"I have been a keeper since I was ten. I played three years at Ellon Meadows, then two years with Lewis United. I also had a year's trial with Aberdeen FC, but then in the first week of the summer holidays, I was signed by St Johnstone.

"I was still trialling for Aberdeen while St Johnstone were looking at me. They thought I had signed for Aberdeen so didn't come for me. They only came in when they realised I was only trialling. I left Aberdeen because St Johnstone were offering better conditions.

"I went to train with the Under

20s at Easter. I was down for three days. All I had to do was be myself – train how I usually train – and that's how I got signed.

"A year ago, I would never have seen myself here. When I became a keeper, I didn't have any ambition to become a professional. I never thought I was anywhere near good enough, but now I am at an SPFL club training with other professionals! I'm playing and training with people way older than me. So this really feels like a dream.

"Hopefully, this will lead to a fulltime contract; that's what I want because right now I'm on a pro youth, so I don't get the opportunity to play at a higher level yet. However, I have been training with first team keepers, Steven Banks, Zander Clark and Big Al Mannus, and working with them has improved everything in my game as both Alan and

"Banksie" are highly experienced keepers. Banksie played in the English Premier League and Alan is a national keeper for Northern Ireland. Working with them is a great experience! I hope I can train with them one day full time.

"I don't play with the Under 20s yet, as I am too young, but I do something train with them and I'm sometimes on the bench at their games. I play Under 17s.

"I'm gaining experience all the time. I've been on the bench at the Under 20s league games against Dundee United at Tannadice and against Aberdeen at Balmoor. I was also on the bench at their friendly at Fraserburgh in the testimonial game which finished 3-3. I also helped the first team kit man at Pitoddrie and at Celtic Park. I helped with the kit and gear for the warm up and game, and also got to watch the game for free."

Thanks for talking to us, Edward. Good luck for the future. Let's hope that one day we'll see you saving goals in the Premier League!
